## Juggler Field Update

As you can all see, we are excited to witness the progress on the Juggler Field and wanted to provide our community a project update directly from William McCarthy, NDRS Project Team Leader for the redevelopment of NDRS 2008 - present.

**Project Summary**: The completion of the Notre Dame all-weather sports field; parking facilities and landscaping and final amenities is scheduled to be completed in its entirety by year's end and this will complete the redevelopment of the entire NDRS campus.


**Background**: The planning for the redevelopment of NDRS began in 2002 with the initial conceptual plans and development proformas that were completed in 2006. The completion of the

Notre Dame redevelopment has been done in three phases. The completions are as follows:

Phase I: Father Joe Ponti Academic Wing; Father Cuddy Auditorium; and renovations and upgrades



to the Alumni Hall (gymnasium and fine arts wing) (2010)

Phase II: Completion of the school's chapel and Ministry facilities; staff room; music and fine arts facilities; and cafeteria and ancillary space (2015)

Phase III: Completion of the all-weather sports field, parking, and landscaping (2020)

A few interesting statistics:

- As of September 15th, The field project is 60% complete
- The all-weather, full size sports field will provide NDRS teams with their first ever home field since the school was first opened in 1953!
- The field seating will provide up to 738 viewing seats
- There is no other high school collegiate campus comparable to NDRS in the province

# Notre Dame and the Covid 19 Challenge

Just how do you deal with a secondary school population of 750 students when a pandemic hits? It wasn't a question that had occurred to many prior to the spring of 2020, but when it had to be answered, the Administration, Staff, Education Committee, and student body of Notre Dame responded responsibly and positively.

#### The First Response

When the reality of the Covid 19 infection became known, Notre Dame went into immediate action, effectively shutting down the school the morning of March 11th, before the March Spring Break. Clearly, this posed a number of problems which had to be dealt with immediately. The Administration and Staff instituted an on-line programme, with students being instructed in eight block cycles of classes being given Monday and Tuesday and Thursday and Friday. Wednesday was used as a flex day, allowing teachers to prepare classes, mark assignments, and contact students who needed help. Students enrolled in Student Support were taught at the school in groups of three, each group assigned a teacher to assist them as needed. The result was that all students were able to finish their school year and able to advance to the next year in

September. Generally, parents and teachers reacted most positively to the school's response.

Meanwhile, under the leadership of the Administration, led by the maintenance workers Kevin Gallivan and Richard Bonnett, the school was subjected to a deep clean, students being scheduled in small groups to come and empty their lockers. Of course, certain activities, including Spring sports, were cancelled. Most significantly for the Grade 12 students, this impacted the Graduation functions. The Prom had to be cancelled, much to the disappointment of the students, many of whom had already purchased their prom attire.

#### Graduation

A virtual Graduation ceremony was arranged by staff members Sue Cirillo, Jessica Isherwood and Roberta Marghetti. Over a period of two days, graduating students were assigned a time slot to arrive at the school with their immediate family. On arrival, the student was presented with a rosary; the mother was presented with a rose. A family photo was then taken by Ms. Schaper-Kotter. The family then entered the gym, where the individual graduate was announced; the student's achievement at Notre Dame was also announced as he or she crossed the stage, receiving a diploma and having a professional photo taken by Artona Studio. The virtual ceremony went well and the result may be viewed on the Notre Dame web site. The families of the graduates appreciated the great effort that had been made, which was recognized as a fine way of making up for that which was lost.

#### **Return to School**

While it had been hoped that the pandemic would have ended by the time to return to school in September, as we all know, such was not the case. Preparations for the opening of school were undertaken in the summer. It was determined by the Administration and staff that the school year would be divided into four semesters of ten weeks. In each semester, students are scheduled to take two courses, with on-site class four times a week, school being in session Monday through Friday, with Wednesday as a flex day to allow students to complete and submit assignments, teachers marking the work submitted and contacting students when necessary.

Of course, a number of precautions had to be put in place. Students move in designated cohorts; they are permitted to enter the school between 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. There is no access to lockers. No parents or visitors are allowed into the school. Cleaning stations have been placed throughout the school, with cleaning of classrooms taking place after each class. Students are required to wear masks on entry into the school and are encouraged to wear masks in class. School ends at 3:00 p.m., with two classes of two and a half hours duration scheduled for each student each day. Once the students have been dismissed, Mr. Gallivan and Mr. Bonnett supervise a deep cleaning of the school each day. While far from a perfect system, that which has been instituted meets the Ministry of Education requirements and seems to be the best compromise between no school and regular school, permitting as it does all the students to continue with their education in a satisfactory fashion. It is hoped that a limited number of sports and other extra-curricular activities will be able to be resumed before the end of the school year, depending on the situation with regard to the virus. Meanwhile, the student body is cooperating admirably and dealing well with the difficult situation. However, the entire school population hopes that all these compromises will not have to be in place much longer.

#### **Continuing Challenges**

In addition to the obvious challenges, the school faces other problems. Most notably, there is the financial problem. Happily, school enrolment has been maintained, with many parents making enormous sacrifices for their students to attend Notre Dame. However, as with many schools, both public and private, the absence of International Students results in a significant loss of fees. At the same time such fund-raising activities as have in the past aided the school in funding its building programme have had to be cancelled. There will be no Uncorked Wine Tasting event and no Pub Night. And, of course, the Alumni Trivia Night has also had to be cancelled. However, it is hoped that a new form of the annual Parent Association Lottery will take place. In the past, families were each asked to pick up and sell a book of tickets. Since this is now not permitted, it is hoped that an On-line Lottery will take place, similar to that of the PNE Home Lottery this year. It is hoped that the entire Notre Dame community will support this endeavour as the school continues to finance its debt and to pay for the soon to be completed Athletic Field.

Meanwhile, the school continues to deal with the challenges of the pandemic, doing its best to ensure that the students receive as much as possible a happy secondary school experience. As at the best solution to a difficult and unexpected problem. Way to go, Notre Dame!

## **Finances at Notre Dame**

It is reported elsewhere in this letter that fund raising is still a necessity at Notre Dame. Many may question this, but the fact is that it is truly essential.

In the early years, the school fee was \$10.00 per month which was, at the time, a significant amount. The only reason that the school was able to function was that the Sisters of Charity staffed the school with a staff of ten Sisters whose total salary for the year was \$5500. Notre Dame owes

the year progresses it is hoped that some sports and extra-curricular activities will be set in place, while the staff continues to make every effort to provide the students with a worthwhile educational experience. With the help of the community and the intercession of Our Lady of Lourdes, this will be possible.

Mr. DesLauriers expressly wishes to thank for all their support and cooperation, all the stakeholders in the community: Deacon Boreham, the Education Committee, the parents, the staff and the students. Together they have worked to arrive an enormous debt, both financial and spiritual, to the Sisters of Charity of Halifax for all that they did to make the school a reality. At that time, there was one part time office worker. Lay teachers were paid approximately 60% of Public School teacher salaries. For many years, the school was kept running by Bingo. Gradually school enrolment increased from approximately 300 in 1963 (including the addition of a grade 8 class in 1973) to 750. A major leap forward was made in 1979 when the NDP government agreed to pay one third of Independent Schools' operating expenses; ten years later, this was increased to one half of the operating expenses. It is noteworthy that the capital costs (building and furnishing) are still the financial responsibility of the school. Of course, the school was no longer able to rely on the Sisters of Charity, while the entirely lay staff size increased from 13 in 1962 to 70 today, with salaries much closer to, but still less than those paid in the Public School. At the same time, operation expenses have increased enormously thanks to the increased demands of dealing with increased enrolment; a hugely expanded course offering to meet the educational needs of an evermore complex world; and the addition of a large Student Services sector. Similarly, because of more complex school business, including payroll, health and pension benefits; and transactions with the CISVA and the Government, office staff has been increased from one part time receptionist, to four full time and one part time worker. Because of all this, despite Government funding, there has been a steady increase in the school fee, which today is \$4250.00 per student. In addition, each family is required to pay \$400.00 annually to help service the school debt. It is obvious therefore that the parents alone cannot be asked to contribute more than they already are to finance the school.

With no Government assistance, many millions of dollars were spent on building the new school building, with a considerable sum now being spent on completing the project with the nearly finished Athletic Field. The Vancouver Archdiocese did contribute 11 million dollars to the project, and the feeder parishes contributed another \$11 million, while welcome support from many Alumni and friends of the school has resulted in the donation of generous sums of money. However, the school still has a large debt to pay. Many alumni have fond memories of their years at Notre Dame, a school where they truly enjoyed their high school experience, often forming life-long friendships. It is hoped that they will remember this and give back to the school. Most educational establishments seek financial assistance from their Alumni. It is hoped, therefore, that pleas to donate to the Notre Dame Foundation or to support other fund-raising activities at the school will not be ignored by the Alumni. Their continued assistance is vital to the financial well-being of the school.
